This is a film from members of the Glenn family who were active in the NE JACL when they were residents of Cambridge. Before They Take Us Away captures the previously untold stories of Japanese Americans who self-evacuated from the West Coast in the wake of Executive Order 9066 during World War II. Approximately 5,000 Japanese Americans managed to self-evacuate during the one-month window when it was allowed because they were told they could avoid incarceration. Their stories are told by the filmmaking team of producers **Evelvn** Nakano Glenn, Patrick Glenn, Antonia Grace Glenn and Tim Becherer.

No Monument: In the Wake of the Japanese American Incarceration through May 15 This is a focused, small-scale, group exhibition curated by Genji Amino with Christina Hiromi Hobbs. It includes a small selection of works made by Japanese Americans in the American concentration camps during WWII that are on Ioan from the Japanese American National Museum. By gathering together works such as Isamu Noguchi's haunting wood and bone Monument to Heroes (1943), Kay Sekimachi's ethereal hanging fiber work Ogawa II (1969), and Patrick Nagatani's 1994 photographs of the former camps in Utah and Idaho, the exhibition presents a range of approaches to abstraction developed following the era of Japanese American incarceration.
