DAY OF REMEMBRANCE 2022

This year our Day of Remembrance commemoration will be a little different. It will span two months and will feature a museum exhibition with supporting programs sponsored by the New England JACL. The **Museum of Work & Culture** in Woonsocket, RI, is hosting the exhibit *Righting a Wrong: Japanese Americans and World War II*. This poster exhibition was developed by the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, DC, and tells the story of the incarceration of Japanese and Japanese Americans during World War II and their survival after it. Embracing themes that are as relevant today as they were 80 years ago, the poster exhibition brings forth themes of identity, immigration, prejudice, civil rights, courage, and what it means to be an American. Chief among them are those by Beijing-based freelance photographer **Li Ju** that chronicle the route from Sacramento to Promontory Summit, Utah. The Interactive StoryFile of Lawson Ichiro Sakai ongoing

An exciting new exhibit using cutting edge technology is being introduced at the Museum called *The Interactive StoryFile of Lawson Ishiro Sakai*. The exhibit will allow the viewer to interact with the image of Sakai and ask questions about his life and experiences as a member of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team during World War II. Sakai was filmed over five days providing answers to more than 1000 questions. His responses were captured by 27 cameras that will allow the video to eventually be projected as a holographic image once
