Filmmaker set for 2014 Day of Remembrance Program

New England JACL will be joining Tufts University to sponsor this year's Day of Remembrance program. Featured will be filmmaker Tad Nakamura, the director of the film *Pilgrimage*. The program is tentatively set for Monday, February 24 at 6 pm on the Tufts University campus in Medford. Final date and time will be in the February newsletter. Nakamura is the Community Projects Coordinator at UCLA's Center for EthnoCommunications. In 2006 he directed *Pilgrimage*, a film about the first pilgrimage to Manzanar and the impact it had on internees and their children and how communities came together to mobilize for change. Nakamura's latest film was *Jake Shimabukuro: Life on Four Strings*, a documentary about the ukulele virtuoso that was shown on PBS last year.

MIT program explores suicide in Japan

The film Saving 10,000: Winning the War on Suicide in Japan will be featured in a program at MIT on January 23. The film tells the story of an Irishman's personal passion to uncover the true causes of the high suicide rate in Japan. The disturbing findings include the Japanese media's perverse love affair with suicide, a variety of cruel and predatory economic pressures, and an outdated and failing mental health care system. The program will be followed by a panel discussion featuring Dr. Daisuke Fujisawa, a psychiatrist from Keio University School of Medicine and a visiting researcher at Massachusetts General Hospital, and members of the MIT Department of Mental Health and Counseling Services. This event is free and open to the public and is sponsored by the MIT-Japan Program with co-sponsors New England JACL and Japan Society Boston.
