Save Feb. 29 for Day of Remembrance 2020

Join the New England JACL on Saturday, February 29, for our Day of Remembrance program. We are planning an afternoon of speakers and activities on the MIT campus in support of **Tsuru for Solidarity**, a nonviolent, direct action project of Japanese American social justice advocates working to end detention sites and support front-line immigrant and refugee communities. Guest speaker for our February program will be Carl Takei, Senior Staff Attorney at ACLU's Trone Center for Justice and Equality and one of the co-chairs of Tsuru for Solidarity. He will be joined by a panel of representatives from New England organizations working for refugee and immigrant rights.

Tsuru for Solidartiy is organizing a *National Pilgrimage to Close the Camps* to be held June 5 to 7, in Washington, DC. The group plans to bring 125,000 paper cranes, or *tsuru*, to Congress as an expression of solidarity with, and support for, the immigrant and refugee communities in the United States. The cranes represent the 125,000 Japanese who were incarcerated in America during WWII. The New England JACL is one of the nation's community groups supporting this event.

You can be part of the National Pilgrimage by joining us for a "*tsuru* fold-in" following the program of speakers on February 29. We will be folding cranes to add to the *tsurus* that will be taken to Washington, D.C. in June. The Pilgrimage is expected to be the largest gathering of Japanese Americans since the WWII incarceration. Applicants sought for JACL National Scholarships

JACL's 2020 National Scholarship Program is accepting applications for the approximately 30 awards granted incoming college freshmen, undergraduate and graduate students. Interested students should carefully read the information about the types of scholarships available, some are aimed at students in specific fields of study. Eight scholarships are for incoming college freshmen in all fields of study. Among the eight undergraduate awards available are scholarships in journalism, agriculture and public/social services. The seven graduate awards include scholarships in dentistry, general medicine, education, social justice and community service. There are three law school scholarships as well as special awards for financial need, in the performing arts, and Japanese American creative arts.

Advocacy Opportunities: Join JACL in supporting Legislation for Immigrants

The Dignity for Detained Immigrants Act (HR 2415) will come before Congress this year to support the rights of asylum seekers and immigrants. The bill proposes changes to how the US treats asylum seekers and all immigrants coming to the United States and ensures transparent and responsible conduct around immigrants awaiting a court decision. It will implement a shift from sending immigrants to detention facilities to alternative, independent housing under community-based supervision. It will also address transparency in how the US runs its detention facilities to ensure that workers are respecting immigrants' rights.
