Hiroshima Day with First Parish Dorchester

Friday, August 6, starting at 6 pm, film at 8pm

First Parish Dorchester, 10 Parish Street, Dorchester A program commemorating the August 6, 1945 bombing of Hiroshima. Beginning at 6 pm activities for kids will include the folding of origami cranes led by Akemi Chayama from the Boston Children's Museum. Tim Nagaoka, a Boston Public School teacher, will fold a giant paper crane with a 12 ft X 12 ft piece of paper. The cranes will be strung and hung in the entrance to the meetinghouse as a symbol of peace. At 8 pm the documentary **Paper** Lanterns will be screened. The film tells the story of atomic bomb survivor Shigeaki Mori who spent his life finding the families of 12 American POWs killed by the Hiroshima bomb. The film's producer and co-director Barry Frechette will be on hand for a Q&A following the screening. This event is free and open to the public.

Museum of Fine Arts, 465 Huntington Avenue, Boston Conservation in Action: Japanese Buddhist Sculpture

A rare, behind the scenes look at the conservation of seven Buddhist sculptures. Visitors are invited to watch as conservators study and treat the sculptures in a public conservation studio. The wooden figures – images of worship depicting Buddhas, Guardian Kings, and a Wisdom King – are decorated with polychromy or gilding and date from the 9th to 12th centuries. The conservation project occupies an entire gallery in the Museum, allowing visitors to observe the techniques employed by conservators as they carefully clean the sculptures and secure areas of loose paint, lacquer, and gilding. Japanese Garden, Tenshin-en

Amid the disruption of the pandemic of the last year and a half, many of us may have forgotten about a Japanese Garden right in the heart of Boston. Dedicated in 1988, *Tenshinen*, or the "Garden of the Heart of Heaven," is a contemplative Japanese garden. It is named for the Museum's curator of Chinese and Japanese Art, Kakuzo Okakura (known in Japan as Okakura Tenshin), who worked at the MFA from 1904 until his death in 1913. The entrance to the garden, pre-COVID, was across the street from the Museum parking garage and open parking lot on Museum Road. In the Light of a Shadow is inspired by the connection between two protests -- the tragic events known as "Bloody Sunday" from Selma, Alabama and Derry, Northern Ireland. The installation spans the entire football-field size Building 5 gallery and provides an immersion experience of moving shadows and evocative soundscape. Kaino has had solo exhibits at the Modern Art Museum of Fort Worth, The Andy Warhol Museum, the Museum of Contemporary Art in San Diego, and the Whitney Museum of American Art, among others. A Life in Pieces: The Diary and Letters of Stanley Hayami through January 9, 2022 virtual exhibition

The exhibit brings to life Hayami's writings from camp and his wartime letters with a 3D virtual experience that can be accessed by smartphone. In 1944, at the age of 19. he was drafted into the 442nd Regimental Combat Team. He was killed in Italy while trying to rescue a fellow soldier during combat.
