From Dachau to Salvation – A Story of Unexpected Heroes

Hosts **Koji Sakai** and **Michelle Malizaki** explore the incredible journey of Holocaust survivor **Solly Ganor** and his unexpected salvation by Japanese American soldiers during World War II. Ten Times Better, which captivated audiences at film festivals and events across the country, tells the story of **George Lee**, a teenaged refugee from China who leapt his way into dance history in ballet and on Broadway. After a long and illustrious career, Lee retired in Las Vegas. He was 88 years old when director **Jennifer Lin** discovered him working as a blackjack dealer. By then, few were aware of his previous exploits. **Ten Times Better** helped to restore Lee's place in dance history. This summer, violets, nasturtiums and hydrangeas escape from the Gardner's greenhouses and rain down the Anne H. Fitzpatrick Façade (outdoors) in a site-specific installation by Artist-in-Residence Yu-Wen Wu. Inspired by Isabella's passion for plants and the loving care given to the "Living Collection" by the Museum's horticulture team, Wu composed a collage of photographs of the Gardner's flowers, transforming individual blossoms into a windswept shower blooming bright against dark storm clouds. Heaven & Earth: The Blue Maps of China

How do maps contribute to a sense of national and cultural identity? During the first decades of the 19th century, China was in a moment of transition, grappling with its geopolitical status as both an ancient and modern nation-state. It was in this moment that two series of large-format maps, one terrestrial and one celestial, were printed in the city of Suzhou. These maps were presented in an extraordinary format, on eight vertical sheets printed in the style of rubbings. Even more strikingly, they were rendered in a rich Prussian blue coloring.
