Watanabe joins President Obama's Commission on AAPIs

Paul Watanabe has been appointed by President Obama to his national Advisory Commission on Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders (AAPI). Watanabe, an associate professor of political science at UMass Boston, is the University's director of the Institute for Asian American Studies, a position he has held since 2003. Obama established the Advisory Commission in 2009 to work with agencies throughout the federal government to improve the health, education and economic status of AAPI communities. Watanabe is one of 11 persons named to the Commission.

Watanabe has also served as chair of the U.S. Census Bureau's National Advisory Committee on Racial, Ethnic and Other Populations since 2012. He is also president of the Nisei Student Relocation Commemorative Fund, a national program that provides scholarships for Southeast Asian students. At UMass, his focus areas include American foreign policy, American political behavior, ethnic group politics and Asian Americans.

In making the appointment, President Obama said, "These men and women bring extraordinary dedication to their roles and will serve the American people well. I look forward to working with them."

The TOMODACHI Internship Program is accepting applications for spring 20016 internships in Japan. The program is open to American students currently enrolled in any accredited college and allows students to participate in a wide variety of areas in Japan including government, financial services, NPO/NGO, media, entertainment, fashion, journalism, IT and consulting. Operation Tomodachi was born in the aftermath of the Great East Japan Earthquake of March 11, 2011, when the US and Japanese governments worked together successfully to provide immediate humanitarian relief to the Tohoku region. Building on this cooperation and spirit, the TOMODACHI Internship Program was created, led by the US Embassy in Tokyo and the US-Japan Council, a non-profit organization, and supported by the government of Japan, as well as corporations, organizations and individuals in the US and Japan. The goal of TOMODACHI is to invest in the next generation of Japanese and American leaders through educational and cultural exchanges.
