WGBH to host virtual event featuring Asian Americans series

Boston's PBS station is bringing its annual Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month celebration online on **Monday, May 4 from 7 to 8 pm**. The virtual event will feature film clips from **Asian Americans**, a new five-hour PBS series, followed by a discussion moderated by Pam Eddinger, president of Bunker Hill Community College. Panelists will include, S. Lee Chiang, producer; Renee Tajima-Pena, series producer; and Winifred C. Chin, co-author of *Paper Son, One Man's Story*. Asian Americans will be broadcast on PBS stations nationwide (WGBH in Boston) on **May 11 and 12.** The series delivers a bold, fresh perspective on a history that matters today, more than ever. As America becomes more diverse and more divided while facing unimaginable challenges, how do we move forward together? Told through intimate personal stories, the series will cast a new lens on U.S. history and the ongoing role that Asian Americans have played.

Episode 1: **Breaking Ground** – The immigrant generations from China, India, Japan, the Philippines, and beyond. Their challenges and successes.

Episode 2: **A Question of Loyalty** – Loyalties tested during World War II, families imprisoned, brothers fighting on opposite sides.

Episode 3: **Good Americans** – The Cold War years, the "Model Minority" and still targeted as foreigners, aspiring for national political office.

Episode 4: *Generation Rising* – A young generation fights for equality, new identity as Asian Americans, new Asian American immigrants.

Episode 5: **Breaking Through** – New conflicts over immigration, race, economic disparity, and shifting world order. A new generation of Asian Americans.
