New Study: Pandemic Impact on Asians in Boston

The **Institute for Asian American Studies at UMass Boston** has released a report on Asian American experiences during the first year of the pandemic. Chinese, Vietnamese and South Asians with limited income and English proficiency were recruited for the study because they are often underrepresented in general surveys. It was found that a sizable proportion experienced financial loss, reduction in work hours, racial prejudice and other impacts. For a copy:
