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Chinatown Then and Now explores 30-year history

A new report on the dramatic gentrification of Chinatowns in Boston, New York City, and Philadelphia has been published by the Asian American Legal Defense and Education Fund (AALDEF). The report that covers three decades and contains land-use data from the three largest Chinatowns on the East Coast. The AALDEF, in collaboration with community partners, academic institutions, and hundreds of volunteers, spent a year recording data, block-by-block and lot-by-lot, in order to document the existing land uses in the three Chinatowns. The report includes current commercial, residential and industrial patterns in the Chinatowns that shed light on the importance of these neighborhoods to immigrant communities and highlight spaces of particular vulnerability to gentrification.
