CAAM Fellowships for Asian American filmmakers

The Center for Asian American Media (CAAM) Fellowship Program is a year-long career and project development opportunity with a focus on nurturing mentor-fellow relationships within the Asian American documentary community in partnership with the A-Doc Network (Asian American Documentary Network). The program will select three to five Fellows each year and is designed specifically for the next generation of Asian American social issues documentary mid-career filmmakers. They are seeking applicants from under represented geographies and identities within the Asian American community. In addition to Asian American documentary directors and producers, CAAM is seeking cinematographers, editors and other creatives in the field who are looking to make the transition into directing or producing. **Deadline for application is Monday, November 18, 2019**. Now in her 90s, Kusama has spent the last 30 years living in a mental institution in Japan.
