Pilgrimages are planned this fall to the Poston, Arizona incarceration camp and to the WWII Department of Justice camp in Crystal City, Texas.

The **Poston Pilgrimage** will be held October 11 to 12 at the Blue Water Casino in Parker, Arizona, and at various Poston locations on the Colorado River Tribes Reservation. The **Crystal City Pilgrimage** will be held October 31 to November 3. This Texas facility was one of more than 60 Department of Justice detention camps opened during WWII to imprison up to 4,000 "potentially dangerous" men, women and children of Japanese, German and Italian descent who were residing in the US. At it's peak the camp held 4,000 people. Of that total, 2,300 were Japanese - half of whom were citizens and residents of Peru and other Latin American countries. The prisoners were being prepared to use in prisoner exchanges with Japan and Germany. The facility was officially closed in 1948.
