Set in Cambridge, the five-character play will feature New York actor Glenn Kubota as Koji. It is described as a love story for grownups: "In a blink, Emily's Harvard Square world falls apart. Her husband Koji suddenly embraces his Asian roots. Her friend Jeremy's work on his novel gets interrupted by a health scare and his sister Trish moving in. Through Hiroshima Eyes: The Hibakusha Art of Junko Kayashige October 1 through 31, 2011, Gallery Talk October 13 at 5:30 pm Gutman Library, Harvard School of Education, 6 Appian Way, Cambridge.

When Hiroshima was bombed on August 6, 1945, Junko Kayashige had just entered elementary school. She was in a home one mile from where the A-bomb hit. She survived, badly injured, but lost several members of her family. Through her art, she says "I wanted to depict the foolishness of humans who attempt to solve problems with war and destruction. It is hard for me to revisit and recount my experience, but nuclear weapons are still threatening our lives." Her paintings have been shipped from Japan for this exhibit with support from the American Friends Committee. The artist will share her story in a gallery talk at the Gutman Library on Thursday, October 13 from 5:30 to 7 pm. The Primary Source will also present a talk about the exhibit on Wednesday, October 19 from 4 to 5:30 pm at the Cambridge Friends Meeting House,
